If you are new to providing support to students with a disability, the following questions are aimed at assisting you in getting started and identifying the type of support a student will require.

Background

Education Providers have a requirement to provide accessible learning materials to students with a disability under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 and the supporting Education Standards 2005. In other words, assistive technologies used by students, are able to read the materials.
